

ABSTRACT

The Adolescent Health Care Program (PKPR) is a health service for adolescents through special treatments tailored to their desires, preferences, and needs. The Janti Health Center in Malang City has implemented the PKPR program since the beginning of 2023, but its implementation has not been successful despite the program being socialized. Based on interviews and documentation with the PKPR coordinator at the Janti Health Center, it is known that the Janti Health Center can be considered capable of implementing PKPR because it has implemented the PKPR program with three criteria as mentioned in the National PKPR Standards book. This study is a qualitative descriptive study where data were collected through in-depth interviews, observations, and document reviews. This research was conducted at the Janti Health Center in Malang City. The reason for choosing this location is because it is a Health Center that implements the PKPR program. The main informants are 2 school adolescents, the key informant is the PKPR program coordinator, and the supporting informants are the implementers of the PKPR program at the Janti Health Center and the UKS (School Health Unit) supervisor. The results show that, in terms of knowledge, attitudes, funds, human resources, and school support, there are no obstacles to implementing the PKPR program. However, the program is still not optimal. Based on this research, it is recommended to continue the PKPR program but to improve the frequency of activities, and program socialization, involve parents in program implementation, enhance cooperation among relevant agencies, and conduct routine monitoring and evaluation of PKPR activity implementation.
